THE WASHINGTON POST

Gail Hillow Watkins milks a single idea to the nth degree with moments of success. The artist filled the gallery with pale putty- and chalk-colored panels shaped into friezes or totems or arched like early Renaissance icons; a few are gilded at their edges. All are made from layering the rainbow-bright pages of Sunday newspaper comics onto canvas or paper, then sanding down the surface to create the weathered appearance of much older artworks. Some cartoons are sanded beyond recognition, leaving little visual interest beyond the faux-weathered surface. The works that sustain our attention reveal the funny pages as deeply melancholic; the artist suggests that they're soon-to-be relics of times past.
